## SEMESTER 1 FINAL MARKS STATEMENTS

Semester one final mark statements were made available to all students **January 30, 2014**. Students were expected to take this home to share with you. If this did not occur, please call the school and a copy will be sent home. The only reason a student may not receive their mark statement would be due to outstanding textbooks or school fees. ## SEMESTER 2 COURSE OUTLINES

## SEMESTER 2 REPORT CARDS

The **first report card** will be issued to students on **March 14, 2014**. This will be a formal report card, which will provide you with a summary of progress in all subjects to date with the exception of work experience and related programs. Please review these results with your child.



The **second report card** will be issued **between April 28 and May 2, 2014**. Each teacher will schedule their own release dates based on the completion of a unit of work in each individual course. Although there will be no formal interviews with the second report card, interviews may be initiated at anytime of the semester by parents or teachers.

The **final report card** for this semester will be available for pick up in late June or early July. The date will be announced closer to the exact date. You are reminded that all Diploma Exam marks are mailed directly to the student from Alberta Learning.

I hope the process of communicating your child's progress provides you with the information you require. If you would like any further information at any time during the semester, please feel free to contact the school about your child's progress.

## GRAD NEWS UPDATES

Within the past month you should have received an events bulletin with information about fund raising events, grad photos, and Commencement.

With the arrival of the second semester, many of our Grade 12's thoughts are turning to **Commencement Ceremonies on May 24<sup>th</sup>, 2014**. We thought it would be of interest to review the requirements/criteria that must be met to allow a student to participate in commencement 2014.

Participation in the **Commencement Program** in May will be based on the following criteria:

- a. The student is registered in a program leading to one of the following:
  - An Alberta High School Diploma
  - An Alberta High School Certificate of Achievement
  - A three-year non-credit Certificate program in Special Education leading to a local school-leaving certificate
- b. The student must be eligible to complete all of the requirements of **one of the above** programs **by June 30 of the current school year**.
- c. Students using Distance Learning courses as part of their program requirements **must have 2/3 of their lesson completed and graded satisfactorily prior to inclusion on the final commencement list**.
- d. Judgement for inclusion on the **first draft** of the commencement list will be made on the basis of Final Semester 1 marks, and 1st Report Card marks for second semester subjects.

**Students who are failing Second Semester courses which are necessary for the criteria described in a) above, or who have not completed 2/3 of their required distance learning lessons satisfactorily, will receive a written warning (with a copy sent to parents) following the first report card marks indicating that they may not be included in the commencement program.** If these courses are not improved to a passing level by the 2nd report card, the student will not be included on the final commencement list.

- e. Judgement for inclusion on the **final** commencement list will be made on the basis of the Final Semester 1 marks and the **2<sup>nd</sup> report card marks** for the second semester subjects.

Students who are failing second semester courses which are necessary for the criteria described in a) above, or who have not completed 2/3 of their required distance learning satisfactorily will not be included in the final commencement list.

**(NOTE: Distance Learning lessons needed to fulfil this requirement must be submitted for grading no later than April 15, 2014.)**

**Students who were passing subjects required to meet the criteria listed in a) above at the time of the first report card but are failing those subjects at the time of the 2<sup>nd</sup> report card will not be included in the final commencement list.**

- f. **Students must be in good standing with the school.** Students who are under suspension from school, or who

are not extending reasonable efforts on their academic progress will not be permitted to participate.

Any student not on the **first** Draft of the commencement list, and feels that there are some extenuating circumstances which should be considered, may appeal in writing prior to **April 9, 2014** to the principal. **Students who have no extenuating circumstances are unlikely to have a successful appeal.** The Commencement Appeal Committee will hand down a binding decision by **May 9, 2014**.

Appeals will not be accepted following the determination of the final commencement list in the program.

### Fundraising & Grad Fees

Besides meeting the criteria for commencement, grade 12 students still have the opportunity to earn grad hours (to lower grad fees). There are plans for a second bottle drive on **March 18**. **No other activities are being sponsored by the school and grad council.** Also, the program and decorating committees will begin meeting in the next couple of weeks as planning for commencement 2014 continues.

### Notification of Participation

The grads will receive a commencement letter on March 13, 2014. This letter will contain important information about the week preceding Commencement as well as the day of Commencement. Watch for this letter and if you have any questions, concerns, or comments, or your son or daughter fails to bring home the **March 13<sup>th</sup>** letter, please call the grad advisor, Ms S. Laverty.

## RUTHERFORD SCHOLARSHIP INFORMATION

The Alberta Government offers Alexander Rutherford Scholarships to recognize and reward academic achievement at the Sr. High level and to encourage students to pursue post-secondary studies.

There are two levels of Rutherford Scholarships available, one for students with averages between 75.0% and 79.9%, and another for students with an average over 80%. The Department of Education uses the following requirements for determining eligibility for Rutherford Scholarships:

*It should be noted that applications for the Rutherford scholarships can only be made during the course of their grade 12 year when students have already applied for admission to post – secondary school.*

### **GRADE 10**

**Average of 75.0% to 79.9% in 5 subjects—\$300**

**Average of 80.0% or higher in 5 subjects —\$500**

One of English 10-1 or 10-2, Français 10, 13 or 10-2 and at least two of the following:

- Math 10 C
- Science 10
- Social 10-1 or 10-2
- a second language other than the one used above at the Grade 10 level
- Any two other courses with a minimum three credit value at the Grade 10 level (1000 or 4000 series) including those listed above and combined introductory CTS courses.

**NOTE: \*Averages are not rounded up for Scholarship purposes.**

### C.T.S. COURSES:

Three one credit modules can be combined and used as an option at the Grade 10 and/or Grade 11 level.

Five one credit modules can be combined and used as an option at the Grade 12 level.

To be combined:

- all courses must be from the same level i.e. Introductory, Intermediate or Advanced,
- courses can be from different streams or subject area, i.e. computer courses with welding courses, and
- marks will be averaged

**Note: Applications are due May 1<sup>st</sup>, and are available through the counseling department.**

## REMINDERS FOR PARENTS AND STUDENTS

### GRASSLANDS POLICY DURING INCLEMENT WEATHER

As we continue into the cold winter months, it might be helpful to try clear up any confusion there might be about whether or not the school would continue to operate.

In general terms, the school will always be considered open under all weather circumstances. We do this because not everyone will hear the announcement on the local radio station and may arrive at the school. For this reason the school is to be open.

Bus drivers from the county will determine whether it is safe to run busses to the school and will endeavor to phone the riders on their busses to inform them.

If you ride a bus in town, the bus drivers operate in conjunction with the Superintendent to decide whether or not the in-town busses will run.

Ultimately, the decision on whether or not your child should attend school during inclement weather rests with the parents. If you decide that traveling to school



poses a risk then you should keep your child at home. However, if you decide to send your child to school, the school will be open to accommodate your child and we are able to spend some quality time with the students reviewing and providing individual assistance.

### STUDENT DRESS

The staff would like to remind parents and students to remain mindful of the way students dress to come to school. Please remember that the school is a public place and as such the dress should conform to that standard. Clothing that advertises alcohol and other drugs or uses profanity is not appropriate. Female students are asked to dress in a manner that covers the majority of their body parts. Bare shoulders, cleavage, midsections and back-sides should be covered during school hours. For our male students, we would ask that you wear clothing in such a way that it sufficiently covers your undergarments. If you have questions about appropriate dress, please call the school.

### CAREER COUNSELLING NEWS

It's time to apply for post-secondary! Most Alberta Colleges and Universities began accepting applications October 1<sup>st</sup> and now that students have their 1<sup>st</sup> semester report cards it is important to submit their applications.

**Apply for College or University TODAY!**

This year there is a new way to apply to Alberta's Post Secondary institutions. **ApplyAlberta** is a secure online application system that students will use to apply to one or more post-secondary institutions, and send their Alberta high school transcripts directly to different participating institutions.

Students will start by creating a secure logon account that is password protected. To do this, a student will need to know their Alberta Student Number, if they do not know their number, they can come to the Guidance Department or the School Office and it will be provided. Students will authorize transcript transfer requests and fill out a profile with their personal and academic history. This is sent automatically to each institution the student selects. Once the students select their institution(s) of choice, they will complete the institution-specific part of the application (program/term).

Finally, students will pay the institutions application fee and submit the application (a credit card will be needed). The institution will then process the application and deal directly with the student. To start visit [www.applyalberta.ca](http://www.applyalberta.ca)

## NEWS FROM AROUND THE SCHOOL

### PI DAY COMING SOON

#### *what is pi?*

Pi, the Greek letter  $\pi$ , is the symbol that represents the ratio of the circumference of a circle to its diameter. It is approximately equal to 3.14, but it is not an exact decimal (it is an irrational number) and its accurate calculation has intrigued mathematicians for centuries. At the end of 2013 a super computer running for 94 days computed pi to over 12.1 trillion decimal places. If that were ever printed, the stack of paper would be approximately 350 km high.

**Did you know that a Chinese college student memorized 67,890 digits of pi?**

**It took him 24 hours and 4 minutes to recite to the 67,890th decimal place without an error.**

**He stated he had memorized 100,000 digits but at the 67,891st digit, he said the next digit was a "5", when it was actually a "0".**

Pi Day – March 14<sup>th</sup> (3/14) – promotes not only the fascination with pi and the calculative nature of mathematics but also its artistic and creative side. As in previous years, Pi Day will be celebrated at BCHS with free pie in the cafeteria at lunch. In order to receive their pie, however, students must recite the first 20 decimal places of pi. Pi shirts will, of course, also be welcomed warmly.



### BCHS CHEERLEADING

This is the fifth year a cheerleading program at the high school level has been offered and this year we have a co-ed team with five ladies and three men.

The team cheered at home football games and volunteers in the community. This past year they have wrapped presents for the Smiles for Christmas program.

### CAFETERIA INFORMATION

Our cafeteria is open most of the day beginning at 8:00 AM. We have a policy to not sell candy or chips prior to the morning classes but will have on hand a breakfast bun which is a tasty combination of bacon, egg and cheese on a toasted bun. This is sold for only \$2.50. There are also varieties of muffins, milk, juice, and fruit to start the day. We prepare a different lunch special each day, assorted sandwiches, fresh vegetable and fruit baskets, cookies, and other sweet items. In consideration of healthier eating, we use non-hydrogenated margarine in our baking. A variety of beverages are also available. Menus and prices are posted in the cafeteria. Every lunch special costs \$4.00 on Mondays and \$5.00 from Tuesday to Friday.

**A lunch card is available if you wish to purchase one. The value of the card is \$32.00 but it is sold for \$30.00.** As you purchase items, their value is crossed off the card. This eliminates the need to keep cash on hand but you are responsible for keeping your card in a safe place. If you wish to purchase a lunch card, please make cheques payable to the **B.C.H.S. SADD students have been busy the last few months with attending the provincial SADD conference in November, doing the liquor bag campaign in partnership with Alberta Health Services, doing a BYOB (Bring Your Own Banana) activity at the high school where ice cream banana splits were served, participated in the Santa Parade in partnership with the Super Kids car, an educational jelly bean contest, and baked and delivered Christmas goodies to all the Emergency Services Staff in Brooks.

The most exciting, upcoming SADD event is that the group will be hosting **Kevin Brooks** to do presentations for our high school students and staff on **May 5<sup>th</sup>**. Kevin is a survivor of an impaired driving accident that left him para-

lyzed from the waist down. The passenger did not survive which was a reality Kevin mourns every day as the driver of that vehicle. He's made it his life mission to share his story and educate youth country wide. His goal is to **impact** people's lives by showing how quickly life can change with just one decision.

To **motivate** people to make better, smarter moment-to-moment decisions. To **inspire** people to appreciate life in a profound new way about the reality of destructive choices. Youth relate to him very well and testimonies of how he has impacted youth can be heard on his home page. **Other** Jr. and Sr. high school students and staff in the area will also be attending one of his three presentations that day. The Life Skills program will be working in various Grasslands schools the next few months.
